Description and Sample Questions



Quantitative Aptitude: This subtest assesses the candidate's command of fundamental arithmetic concepts. It rewards conceptual understanding rather than mere computational speed or accuracy—for instance, recognizing numerical relationships rather than performing lengthy fractional calculations. The ESCP Aptitude Test is designed to place candidates in front of a quantitative scenario and evaluate how effectively they organize and interpret the information presented. Ultimately, this section measures a dual competency: mastery of essential mathematical knowledge and, more importantly, the ability to translate a real-world problem stated in natural language into a structured mathematical form before solving it.

Critical Thinking: This subtest measures the candidate's ability to discern logical structures within a text, to group related pieces of information into coherent argumentative chains, and to grasp the author's explicit and implicit viewpoints. Candidates are expected to "enter" the logic of the text—to understand not just what is said, but how and why it is argued. This section rewards those who can navigate efficiently between technical jargon and irrelevant details while isolating the key elements that underpin the author's reasoning. In essence, it evaluates one's ability to analyze, interpret, and critically engage with complex written material.

Applied Reasoning: This subtest gauges the candidate's analytical abilities—specifically, their capacity to categorize information under shared criteria and extract relevant insights from dense data sets. The questions may involve numerical sequences, pattern recognition, or problem-solving puzzles. Candidates are frequently required to apply principles of formal logic. Alongside logical implication exercises, this section may include problems involving order relations, classification, family hierarchies, truth-tellers and liars, or syllogisms. Its goal is to assess both structured thinking and cognitive agility under logical constraints.


Analytical Writing: This subtest evaluates the candidate's capacity to identify semantic similarities within a language (synonymy), to reformulate a passage while preserving its meaning, tone, and stylistic register, and to demonstrate command of grammatical conventions (spelling, conjugation, syntax). Beyond traditional questions involving synonym recognition, orthography, and paraphrasing, this component encompasses a broad spectrum of linguistic and stylistic challenges. Its purpose is to assess the candidate's precision, clarity, and versatility in written expression.
